69th LCMS Convention Highlights

Dear Saints,

Ground yourselves in these words, “But in fact Christ has been raised from the dead, the first fruits of those who have fallen asleep. For as by a man came death, by a man has come also the resurrection of the dead. For as in Adam all die, so also in Christ shall all be made alive. But each in his own order: Christ the first fruits, then at his coming those who belong to Christ” 1st Corinthians 15:20-23.

That was the theme of the LCMS convention last month in Phoenix. What a joy it was to be there and to be centered every day with this life changing reality “Christ is risen indeed, Alleluia!”

One of the highlights of the convention was seeing how God is working to ground His Church in the truth of His Word. Two new church bodies were brought into fellowship with the LCMS. The Evangelical Lutheran Church of Bolivia and Lutheran Mission-Australia both acknowledged the unity of confession we have from God’s Word. Our gracious Father continues to grow His Church!

On matters closer to home, Rev. Mark Schroeder, president of the Wisconsin Evangelical Lutheran Synod (WELS), brought his greetings to the convention. Rev. Schroeder reminded the body that the synods have a shared history. The WELS was started by German Lutherans from Prussia in 1850. Early on, WELS was highly influenced by C.F.W. Walther. “We are confessional Lutherans today because of you,” Schroeder said.

Since 2012 the WELS and the Evangelical Lutheran Synod (ELS) have been meeting with the LCMS. The three synods have a lot in common and continue to work on the few things that separate us from formal fellowship. Please continue to pray that God’s Word will bring unity.

The topic of Pastoral Formation played a prominent role in this convention. For a few years now there has been much discussion concerning routes to ordination. These discussions challenged the LCMS to consider alternate ways to ordination including an online Master of Divinity program (M-Div) or developing a process to accept men with M-Divs from other religious institutions. The discussions were and are good for us. They challenge us to be clear on why pastoral formation looks the way it does. The discussions caused the pastoral formation committee to reexamine the effectiveness of the current system. After much debate on all the pastoral formation resolutions, it became clear that residential Seminary formation will remain the path to ordination.

There were a few resolutions dealing with the Specific Ministry Pastor program (SMP). After much debate the Convention “affirmed and supported” the current parameters of the SMP program. These resolutions passed by over 80%.

The other SMP-related Resolution (6-07) included encouragement for SMP pastors to continue their education by gaining a General Pastor Certification (GPC). SMP pastors do not receive training in the Biblical languages and in general receive 39% of the course work of a residential M-Div graduate. The GPC program includes New Testament Greek and other course work that brings the SMP education up to the same level as the Residential Alternative Route program.

Much of the discussion about pastoral formation leading up to the Convention focused on the current shortage of pastors and a need to make changes in the formation process quickly. What the floor debate on these resolutions revealed was a deep trust that God will provide pastors for His redeemed

sheep and that the formation process currently in place provides faithful, well-equipped under-shepherds.

We also give thanks to God that a few South Dakota District Saints were elected to serve at the National level. Rev. Nabil Nour was re-elected to serve as Vice President of the Great Plains region. Rev. Dr. Michael Kumm was elected to the LCEF Board of Directors. Rev. Dr. Jacob Bobby was elected to the Concordia University Board of directors. Tia Esser was elected to the Concordia University, St. Paul, Board of Regents. Sarah Rausch was elected to serve on the Board for National Mission. Thanks be to God that He gave each of these people gifts that will guide and direct the work of His Church.

Dear Saints, it was a joy to represent you at the 69th Convention of the LCMS. Thank you to all our delegates who gave of their time and talents to serve the Church in this way. Groundbreaking Marks a Joyful Milestone for Mt. Calvary, Brookings

After decades of prayer, planning and perseverance, Mt. Calvary, Brookings, celebrated a long awaited milestone on May 4 with a special groundbreaking ceremony for its ministry expansion project. The event drew an estimated 75 people, including congregation members and neighbors, who gathered for fellowship, a meal and the shared joy of seeing long held hopes finally begin to take shape.

For Annette Streich, Mt. Calvary's communications coordinator for the project, the day carried deep meaning. Streich began working at the church in 2006, when early conversations about expanding the facility were already underway. For years, those conversations remained only that. As the congregation's vision grew clearer, campaign organizers sought architectural partners to help bring that vision to life. Several promising plans fell through, including one firm that ultimately declared bankruptcy.

"It was a long wait," Streich reflected. "It drove us to our knees. We asked God to provide."

Organizers finally connected with a construction company able to stay the course.

"After years of hoping, praying, planning, we finally have construction happening," Streich said.

A Vision That Grew and Changed

Mt. Calvary's initial dream was modest: a fellowship hall where members could share meals, youth could gather, and children could play. Over time, however, the congregation discerned a broader need. The project expanded to include a new sanctuary – one designed to better support worship, accessibility and future growth.

The current sanctuary requires worshipers to climb steps to reach the communion rail. The new sanctuary will eliminate those steps entirely, ensuring full accessibility. It will also feature a larger balcony to accommodate choir and handbells, as well as a private chapel intended for prayer, confession and personal devotion.

Mt. Calvary worships about 200 people each weekend, and leaders hope the expanded space will support continued growth in membership and ministry.

Looking Toward a Historic Celebration

Mt. Calvary was established and joined the LCMS on December 31, 1928. Construction is scheduled for completion in the summer of 2027, but the congregation hopes to celebrate both the project's completion and its 100th anniversary together in the fall of 2028, Streich said. The timeline will also allow for the installation and full operational readiness of the church's pipe organ.

LWML SD Biennial Convention Highlights

The 64th Biennial Convention of the Lutheran Women's Missionary League (LWML) South Dakota District welcomed 142 attendees from across the state on June 5-6 at the Best Western Ramkota Hotel and Conference Center in Rapid City. Attendees met under the theme, "Confidence in His Grace," based on the Bible verse, Let us then with confidence draw near to the throne of grace, that we may receive mercy and find grace to help in time of need (Hebrews 4:16).

The Rev. Albert Sutton, Missionary to the Pine Ridge Reservation, was the keynote speaker. Greetings from LWML were given by national LWML President Eden Keefe. Bible studies were led by the Rev. Dr. Billy Newell from Lord of Life in Sioux Falls.

Convention offerings 2026-2028 Mission Grant Goal was \$3,343. The Grant Goal for the Pine Ridge Ministry was \$2,920. In addition, the Quilt for Mites raised \$310 and Jewelry for Mites raised \$1,016.

Attendees participated in the following servant events: preparing 104 bags for the Pine Ridge Reformation Carnival,

making 700 mission bead bracelets, making necklaces for Forged by Fire, and completing 434 mitten puppets for The Puppet Place at the South Dakota State Fair.

A multitude of gifts were brought for food banks in the Black Hills area and the Cornerstone Mission for our Gifts from the Heart ministry.

12. (TIE) Trinity HOPE: nourishing the bodies and souls of children, \$5,000

Grace and Peace to You!

COUNSELOR'S CORNER

Dear sisters: grace to you and peace!

Hey, have you ever just sat and pondered those words – *grace* and *peace*? I doubt it's the first time you've heard them used like that. You find them in the first few verses in most of the books of the New Testament, and almost all the epistles. For some reason, when the Holy Spirit set out to inspire the Apostles to write Scripture, it's usually one of the very first things He wants to share:

"Ok, Paul, I want you to write a letter to the church in Rome. Tell them, 'Grace and peace.'"

"Now it's time to write to the Ephesians. Be sure to tell them, 'Grace and peace.'"

"Alright, Peter, time to write to the whole Church. Start with a blessing of grace and peace."

Is the Holy Spirit just saying, "Hi," or do you think there might be more to it than that?

I choose to greet you now with these words because I believe there is more to these words than a simple, "Hi." Specifically, I think the words "grace" and "peace" are meant to call our minds back to the foundation of our faith and all things – the Gospel.

Notice how it's always grace first, then peace – never the opposite. Before we have peace, we must have grace.

I remember when I was a Baptist, I struggled to find peace. I knew a lot about God and the Bible. I was always at church. And I worked in His name wherever I went.

That didn't help me.

I was insecure all the time. I put up a front so others would think I was more put together than I actually was. And despite all my good works, I was secretly scared that I wasn't at peace with God.

But then I got my hands on a copy of the Small Catechism and I found God's grace! I finally could see that Baptism isn't a work we do to please God – it's something God does to us that works forgiveness of sins and eternal salvation to all who believe. I could finally see that the Lord's Supper wasn't about us rehearsing an act of remembrance – it's an act of God that brings us

Christ's body and blood for forgiveness, life and salvation.

In short, I learned to see God's grace instead of my own works, and that was what finally brought me peace. All of a sudden, I knew I didn't have to rely upon my own striving (as if I even could!); I knew I could rely upon His.

Dear sisters, this is true for all of us. Apart from Christ, we are all of us lost in sin, death, and despair, and there's nothing we could ever do about it. But when Christ came, when in His grace He gave up his life for us, *that's* what gives us peace with God, a peace that surpasses understanding.

In His grace, I now have the wonderful privilege of serving as your Junior Pastoral Counselor. It is my prayer that as your servant in this capacity, I am able to share with you the peace that He has given me, a peace He promises to all who believe in Him.

I have much more to share with you, but for now ... grace to you and peace! Amen.
