WHAT ABOUT PURGATORY?



Scripture Alone

Dear Saints of the Lord,

On October 31, 1517, the great reformation began with Dr Luther nailing his 95 theses to the church door in Wittenberg. Although the 95 theses addressed the unscriptural teaching of indulgences, kicked off this the reformation which sought to correct the church in matters she had gone

astray. Among these matters where the church went astray is the teaching of purgatory. The current Catholic Catechism teaches, "All who die in God's grace and friendship, but still imperfectly purified, are indeed assured of their eternal salvation; but after death they undergo purification, so as to achieve the holiness necessary to enter the joy of heaven." Rome refers to 1 Cor 3:15, 1 Peter 1:7, and 2 Macc 12:46 to prove that purgatory is a Biblical doctrine.

Purgatory is not taught in Holy Scripture, but it comes from the teaching of Plato, a Greek philosopher who lived 400 years before Christ. Eusebius (Greek historian in the 3rd century) transcribed a discussion of Plato, "Those, however, who live in outstanding holiness rise upward into the purest habitations, where in future they live without toil. But those who lived ordinary lives are conveyed through Acheron into the lake burning with fire; there they pay the penalties for their sins, and then, purified, cleansed or expiated, they are absolved or redeemed, if they have done anything wrong. Then they receive the rewards for their good deed."

Gentile teachings would later influence the Jews who were ruled by the Greeks for roughly 300 years. Alexander the Great conquered the Persian Empire in 330 BC. Alexander was called "The Apostle of Hellenism." He sought to spread Greek culture and religion throughout the world. Alexander died in 323 BC. His generals succeeded him and his kingdom was split up four ways. In 175 BC a wicked king named Antiochius III rose to power and persecuted the Gospel in Judah. 1 Maccabees 1, *"In those days lawless men came forth from Israel and misled many, saying, 'Let us go and make a covenant with the Gentiles round about us, for since we separated*

from them many evils have come upon us.' This proposal pleased them, and some of the people eagerly went to the king. He authorized them to observe the ordinances of the Gentiles ... They joined with the Gentiles and sold themselves to do evil ... Many even from Israel gladly adopted his religion: they sacrificed to idols and profaned the Sabbath. And the king sent letters by messengers to Jerusalem and the cities of Judah; he directed them to follow customs strange to the land, to forbid whole burnt offerings and sacrifice and drink offering in the sanctuary, to profane Sabbaths and feasts, to defile the sanctuary and the priests, to build altars and sacred precincts and shrines for idols, to sacrifice swine and unclean animals, and to leave their sons uncircumcised."

There were still faithful men in Judah though. Matthias and his sons remained faithful to God's Word and refused to obey Antiochus who ordered them to abandon God's Word. Judas was one of Matthias' sons and he became a great general. 2 Maccabees 12 is used by Rome to justify Purgatory and intercession for the dead. The Catholic Catechism, 1032, "This teaching is also based on the practice of prayer for the dead, already mentioned in Sacred Scripture: 'Therefore [Judas Maccabeus] made atonement for the dead, that they might be delivered from their sin.' From the beginning the Church has honored the memory of the dead and offered prayers in suffrage for them, above all the Eucharistic sacrifice, so that, thus purified, they may attain the beatific vision of God. The Church also commends almsgiving, indulgences, and works of penance undertaken on behalf of the dead."

2 Maccabees 12, "On the next day, as by that time it had become necessary, Judas and his men went to take up the bodies of the fallen and to bring them back to lie with their kinsmen in the sepulchers of their fathers. Then under the tunic of every one of the dead they found sacred tokens of the idols of Jamnia. which the law forbids the Jews to wear. And it became clear to all that this was why these men had fallen. So they all blessed the ways of the Lord, the righteous Judge, who reveals the things that are hidden; and they turned to prayer, imploring that the sin that had been committed might be wholly blotted out. And the noble Judas exhorted the people to keep themselves free from sin, for they had seen with their own eyes what had happened because of the sin of those who had fallen. He also took up a collection, man by man, to the amount of 2,000 drachmas of silver and sent it to Jerusalem to provide for a sin offering. In doing this he acted very well and honorably, taking account of the resurrection. For if he were not expecting that those who had fallen would rise again, it would have been superfluous and foolish to pray for the dead. But if he was looking to the splendid reward that is laid up for those who fall asleep in godliness, it was a holy and pious thought. Therefore he made atonement for the dead, that they might be delivered from their sin."¹

Judas faithfully confesses the resurrection of the dead, however, he goes beyond God's Word by sending silver to provide sin offerings for the dead idolaters. When we look at what Leviticus says regarding sacrifices, there is <u>never</u> a command to make sacrifices for the dead. The Law does <u>not</u> mention a purification of the dead. Not only that, but these soldiers intentionally sinned which a sin offering would not have atoned for. Read Numbers 15:27-31 to learn about unintentional and intentional sins. Judas, while trying to save the souls of his soldiers, <u>goes</u> <u>beyond God's Word and acts without God's</u> <u>command.</u> There is not one syllable in the Law of Moses about a sacrifice for the dead.²

The Catholic Catechism also brings two Scripture passages to bear. 1 Corinthians 3:15 - *If anyone's work is burned up, he will suffer loss, though he himself will be saved, but only as through fire.* **Read the chapter for more context. St Paul is speaking about teachers and their teachings.** God destroys those teachers who overturn the foundation, which is Christ (verse 17). The teachings that are in harmony with the foundation are precious stones. Those teachers who hold to Christ, but they teach weak, unnecessary, and unprofitable opinions have good intentions, but their teachings are not expressly taught or found in Scripture. 4th century pastor Ambrose writes, "Let the Word of God come; let it enter the church; let it become a consuming fire, that it may burn the hay and stubble, and consume whatever is worldly; there is heavy lead of iniquity in many; let it be molten by divine fire; let the gold and silver vessels be made better, in order that understanding and speech, refined by the heat of suffering, may begin to be more precious." **God's Word removes the useless teachings and makes true teaching more precious.** Absolutely nothing in this text has to do purgatory. Even the old popes said that 1 Cor 3 as well as 1 Peter 1 do not prove that there is a purgatory.

The final text is 1 Peter 1:6-7, *In this you* rejoice, though now for a little while, if necessary, you have been grieved by various trials, so that the tested genuineness of your faith - more precious than gold that perishes though it is tested by fire - may be found to result in praise and glory and honor at the revelation of Jesus Christ. St Peter writes of the trials that Christians endure which serve to strengthen their faith and cause them to cling tighter to Christ. Christians follow Christ and bear the cross. Again, like 1 Cor 3, this text says nothing regarding a purgatory. **St Peter is not talking about dead Saints being tested, but he is speaking to Christians who endure trials on this side of glory.**

Finally, purgatory contradicts the truth that Jesus suffered for <u>all sin</u> and <u>purges us of sin in</u> <u>the Gospel</u>. This cleansing of sin and purification happens in this life in the Gospel. Ephesians 5, *Christ loved the church and gave Himself up for her, that He might sanctify her, having cleansed her by the washing of water with the Word* (Holy Baptism), so that He might present the church to *Himself in splendor, without spot or wrinkle or any such thing, that she might be holy and without blemish.*

¹ It's also important to remember that 2 Maccabees is not Holy Scripture. The author of 2 Maccabees writes, "So I too will here end my story. If it is well told and to the point, that is what I myself desired; if it is poorly done and mediocre, that was the best I could do." Scripture never talks this way. The Apocryphal books are good and helpful books because they give some good history and wisdom, but they were never taught to be Scripture. The Jews never accepted them as God's Word. Historically, the Church regarded the books as good for Christians to read, but never said they were God's Word. Only the Church of Rome does. At the Council of

Trent (1545) Rome declared all the Apocryphal books to be Holy Scripture which was contrary to what the Church had said regarding these books throughout history.

² We cannot change a person's judgment by our prayers. Either one believes the Gospel and is saved or not. Hebrews 9:27, *it is appointed for man to die once, and after that comes judgment.* We can and do pray for the Saints in heaven. We do this in the funeral liturgy where we pray, "Give to Your whole Church <u>in heaven and on earth</u> Your light and Your peace."
