

REFLECTIONS ON THE SYNOD CONVENTION

My overall impression of the 68th Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod (LCMS) Convention held in Milwaukee July 29–August 3, 2023, is that our beloved church body, in convention, affirmed that which is of utmost importance: *We Preach Christ Crucified*. That was the theme, and that is what we have done since our Synod's inception in 1847.

The Convention emphasized:

- 1) The centrality of the Gospel (again, the theme drove this home). I would point you to the fine essay presented by Concordia Seminary president, Rev. Dr. Tom Egger, as representative of the fine presentations on the centrality of "Christ crucified." His presentation begins at the 3 hour and 12-minute mark on the Sunday morning recording. www.lcms.org/convention/national/livestream
- 2) Our firm stance on God's truth, found in His inspired, inerrant Word. Resolution after resolution had us maintaining what God says about marriage, gender, race, life issues, and many more front-page issues today. See especially the resolutions coming out of Floor Committee #11, Church and Culture; for many of those, see the initial *Today's Business* found here: www.lcms.org/convention/national.
- 3) Our commitment to make Christ known here, near, and far. We heard from many international partners in ministry. We considered many witness and outreach matters, especially coming out of Floor Committee #1 (National Witness) and Floor Committee #2 (International Witness). See *Today's Business* at the link above.

Other reports, observations, and opinions:

- 1) The South Dakota District's lone overture submitted, coming out of our last District Convention, gained a little traction this time, after we had submitted a similar overture to a previous Synod Convention. The overture, this time, was 9-17, found in the *Convention Workbook* (p. 380), and it regards eliminating the distinction between electoral circuits and visitation circuits, and eliminating the need to have a certain number of communicant members in order to comprise an electoral circuit (currently, there is to be a minimum of 1500 members and a maximum of 10,000 members to comprise an electoral circuit). This affects voting delegate representation at Synod conventions. Our overture asked the convention to grant 7 to 20 congregations the ability to be represented at Synod conventions by one lay voting delegate and one ordained voting delegate, *no matter the number of communicant members*. Well, our overture was grouped into Resolution 9-06 (To Appoint Task Force to Evaluate Current Electoral Circuit Parameters), found on page 183 of the Today's Business noted above, and which was approved by the Convention. So, the matter is going to be studied. We'll see where this ends up.
- 2) The SMP program (Specific Ministry Program), a distance-learning route toward ordination, was a matter that came before the Convention; it came away largely unchanged. I think this is good news for our District, since the ministry of SMP pastors has been a tremendous blessing to us. SMP students will continue to be granted vicar status immediately upon seminary enrollment; they can be ordained after two years in the program. That remains unchanged. The revamping of the Concordia University System (Resolution 7-04B; August 1 Today's Business) met with much debate, but in the end, it was adopted by a large majority. I'm hearing that the universities, if not overjoyed by the changes, are satisfied that they will be able to work within the parameters to function as they feel they need to as institutions of the Church firmly committed to our identity as confessional Lutheran Christians. Our universities are such blessings to the Church! Even if the number of church workers produced by our universities is not what it once was, our universities do provide church workers and dedicated laypeople in many, many occupations. And many students, coming to campus as unbelievers, are being brought to faith through the strong witness given concerning the world's Savior!
- 3) The most beautiful and bittersweet moments, for me, came at about 1:30 p.m. on Wednesday, August 2, in the Commemoration of the Faithful Departed. Shown on the screens were pictures of hundreds of ordained and commissioned ministers who, since the last Convention, are now in glory with the Savior. We thanked and praised the God of our salvation for their lives and ministries, and their lives now in glory. There was a big lump in my throat as I saw on the screen the pictures of these servants who served in South Dakota and are now with the Lord: Revs. Ray Adams, Hyle Anderson, Charles Boeder, Paul Consoer, Monte Dell, Bill Dietz, Bob Fedde, and Mr. Marvin Sopko.

WORD FROM THE CENTER – August 21, 2023

Welcome to "Word from The Center" MONDAY, a devotional word from the Center of our faith, Jesus Christ, with reflections from His Word. I'm Gregory Seltz. Today's verses are Matthew 15:21–28, where the Bible says ²¹ Leaving that place, Jesus withdrew to the region of Tyre and Sidon. ²²A Canaanite woman from that vicinity came to him, crying out, "Lord, Son of David, have mercy on me! My daughter is demon-possessed and suffering terribly." ²³Jesus did not answer a

word. So his disciples came to him and urged him, "Send her away, for she keeps crying out after us." ²⁴He answered, "I was sent only to the lost sheep of Israel." ²⁵The woman came and knelt before him. "Lord, help me!" she said. ²⁶He replied, "It is not right to take the children's bread and toss it to the dogs." ²⁷"Yes it is, Lord," she said. "Even the dogs eat the crumbs that fall from their master's table." ²⁸Then Jesus said to her, "Woman, you have great faith! Your request is granted." And her daughter was healed at that moment.

WILL YOU LET JESUS DRAW OUT YOUR FAITH?

This event in the Bible is one of the most difficult to read. It is a moment in the life of a woman who is at the end of her rope. She's overwhelmed by issues with her daughter. Things are out of her control. Her life is in chaos. And yet, at the moment when her life seems to be unraveling, it appears that Jesus "piles on!"

If that's what it appears to you, keep reading. This event is not really about this woman's struggles, monumental as they might be. This event is about her trust in God in ALL things. This event is about her trust in the Savior Whom God the Father had sent for her. This event is about the truth that when all one has in this life is Jesus Christ as Lord and Savior, He is all you need.

In fact, this woman knew that when the darkness and chaos of this world seem to overwhelm, then the uniqueness of Jesus shines even more clearly. No matter what she was facing, Jesus was there; no matter what you and I are facing, Jesus is here. That always makes all the difference. Trust IN HIM. She knew that Jesus would do what was best for her and for her daughter. That's the power of her faith. To that end, HER PERSISTENT FAITH DEMONSTRATES THAT YOU CAN ALSO COUNT ON JESUS, EVEN WHEN YOU CAN'T COUNT ON ANYTHING ELSE!

So even when Jesus is silent for a time, or even when He appears to be unconcerned, the woman in this text urges you not to believe it because Jesus loves you and will do what is best!

She knows what it's like to hold on to Him no matter what. And she would tell you to COUNT ON JESUS WHEN ALL ELSE FAILS. YOU CAN EVEN COUNT ON HIM WHEN HE SEEMS SILENT FOR A TIME. We know that even beyond her example. We know that's true because Jesus' death and

resurrection demonstrate publicly what He thinks about you and me, and what He wants for us all. BACK TO THE LESSON FOR ONE LAST THOUGHT. WHAT ABOUT JESUS' RESPONSES? He seems to put her off, even to mildly insult her (see verses 23 and 26). WHY WOULD HE DO SUCH A THING? IT SEEMS SO UNLIKE HIM.

I say it was to EXHIBIT HER FAITH, to demonstrate her faith for others to see! Her faith remains a shining EXAMPLE, especially for those of us today who might be having a hard time with what we think God is doing or not doing for us at the moment. She was in essence saying, "Whatever you do for me, Jesus, IT WILL BE THE BEST FOR ME. I CAN PUT MY TRUST IN YOU ALONE. So I'm committing my life and my daughter's life to you." PERIOD.

Some people think that the woman's faith caused Jesus to act. That misses the whole point. She knew the depth of the mercy of this Jesus who stood before her. He was THE LORD, THE MASTER, WHO WOULD BRING GOD'S MERCY TO HER AND TO ALL (see verse 22)!

I wish I could have seen Jesus' face. He couldn't wait to bless her trust in Him. He couldn't wait to "exhibit" that faith for others to see so that they too would be blessed by it. When you and I are struggling, let the example of this woman's faith be our faith-commitment too. Then let Him draw out your faith for others to see, empowering your life of trust IN HIM to be the blessing that it is meant to be for those you love. I pray that you will.

PRAYER – Dear Lord, let this woman be an example to us all of faith's persistence to rely upon You as the source and foundation of our very lives, now and forever! Amen.
