THE PAST IS PROLOGUE

Dear Saints,

I hope you have had time to read the February 2026 issue of the Lutheran Witness. The entire edition focuses on Congregational Vacancies.

At any given time, across the Synod there are about 500 vacant parishes. This is not unusual. Vacancies allow movement of pastors by the Holy Spirit's guidance. Vacancies also allow congregations time to reflect on the ministry in their congregation and community and prioritize what their strengths and weaknesses are.

The reality we face today is that our universities and seminaries are producing fewer pastors and church workers. When this is combined with an aging clergy population and increasing retirements, it can give the impression that we are entering a vacancy crisis.

We are not in crisis. Our Lord is very clear when He says, "And behold, I am with you always, to the end of the age" (Matthew 28:20b). And in Romans 8, we hear this: "What then shall we say to these things? If God is for us, who can be against us? He who did not spare his own Son but gave him up for us all, how will he not also with him graciously give us all things" (Romans 8:31-32)?

God provides for His Church. We know that and trust that. He sent His Son to be our Savior. Neither sin nor death, nor the devil nor the grave could hold Him. He rose and promised us this. "For if we have been united with him in a death like his, we shall certainly be united with him in a resurrection like his" (Romans 6:5). The eternal unchangeable hope that we are forgiven does not and will not change no matter how many congregations are vacant.

God is already providing for His Church. Set Apart to Serve, the Synod's initiative to raise up more church workers, is leading to more men and women entering our Concordia University system for church work. Our seminaries are seeing larger class sizes, which will lead to more men available to receive calls into vacant congregations. God is providing, but it will take time.

We are not in vacancy crisis, but we are faced with a 24% vacancy rate in our beloved District. It is easy for us to think that the ministry in this place must be done this way at this time, because this is the way we have always done it. We have more of those luxuries when we are blessed

with a full-time pastor to shepherd the flock and bring God's good and precious gifts to us. When we are vacant, we are required to be more flexible.

When I was in Washington, D.C., for the March for life, I walked by the National Archive building. In front of that building is the statue named "Future." Inscribed beneath "Future" is the phrase, "Past is Prologue."

That is profound. Looking at our past gives direction for our future.

Here is how the Saints in the Dakota Territory were served in the past.

"In 1874 Reverend John F. Doescher was commissioned to serve in Dakota Territory. He reported in 1875 that he was serving 26 stations in eight different counties. It was under Reverend Doescher's direction and leadership that

the Evangelical Trinity Congregation Unaltered Augsburg Confession was organized in 1876 at Heilbronn (southwest of Freeman), Dakota Territory. This was the first congregation on record of what became known as the South Dakota District of the Lutheran Church- Missouri Synod." (*Courageous Faith Bold Witness, A History of the South Dakota District LCMS*, p7.)

One dedicated Pastor preaching and teaching and giving the Good News of Jesus Christ risen from the dead to God's Saints at 26 different places in eight different counties where people adjusted so when the opportunity came to hear the Good News they were there. I can guarantee you they did not all have church at 9 o'clock on Sunday morning! But they did gather in worship. They did have God's Word of Law and Gospel preached to them. Babies were baptized. The Lord's Body and Blood were given to them for the forgiveness of sins. The blessed dead were laid to rest, and hope was preached to the grieving. God was working.

He continues to work, even in times of vacancy.

Dear Saints, during times when your congregation is without a full time resident pastor, I encourage you to remain patient and flexible. God is faithful, and He will provide. And when your pastor is called to serve as a vacancy pastor, please also be patient with him. The number of saints he serves increases, the miles he travels grow, yet the hours in each day remain the same.

God is with us always just as He promises.

Praying for the vacant congregations and those serving the vacant congregations,

SYNOD SEEKS NOMINATIONS FOR LCMS BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEMBERS-AT-LARGE

During its May 2026 meeting, the LCMS Board of Directors will appoint two (2) members-at-large, for three-year terms, to begin November 1, 2026, and end October 31, 2029. Nominations for members-at-large are currently being requested.

One incumbent, Gregory T. Golden, is eligible for reappointment to an additional term. He is presently in his second term; he will automatically be considered in nomination. Louis W. Kastens, III, the other incumbent, resigned May 5, 2025, and an alternate attended in his place.

Members-at-large are eligible to serve no more than three successive terms. The two alternates appointed in 2025 were Nick Avey (Tonganoxie, Kan.) and Collin Bivens (Troy, Ill.).

LCEF also requests that the LCMS Board of Directors appoint **two to three alternates** in case any members-at-large are unable to attend an annual meeting held in November, which this year will be held in-person in St. Louis.

Nominations may be submitted through the new online nomination system at forms.lcms.org/form/LCMS/SECR/APPOINTMENTS/2025-01-LCEF-MAL-NOM. For those with a LISN ID, it can be used to login. For all others, you will use your email address to complete the process.

The deadline for submission of nominations is **Monday, March 9, 2026.**

REPENTANT JOY!

Lent is your yearly reminder that you didn't get away with it.

Whatever sin you did, or continue to do, God sees and knows. You can pull the wool over the eyes of your neighbors. You can look good by giving lots of money to church, or charity or by investing yourself in worthy causes. You can look good by going to church every week or more than once a week, and by praying a lot, so that people think: There goes a good person.

However, you can't pull the wool over God's eyes. Your Father in heaven sees what is secret, even that which nobody else sees. And while you know your own sins better than anyone else, and how sinful you are, God knows them even better than you. Your sin runs deeper than even you know. You didn't get away with it. Thus, Lent is a season of repentance, so that we seek the cleansing that we need; not in what we do, but in what our Lord has done for us. To bend the knees not of our bodies but of our hearts and say: Lord, have mercy on me, a sinner.

And He does. Jesus went to the cross to die for all of our sins – the ones we know and the ones we don't. He knows

them all. The One who knows every sin died for every sin. No sin too little, no sin too great, no sin Jesus did not bear on the cross.

To repent is to change your mind about sin. To let go of it. To confess it. That you don't want it anymore. For the Holy Spirit, through the Word of God, has revealed to you something better to hold onto than your sin: Jesus. The Spirit has given you faith to believe in Him and cling to Him. None of that came from you. It is the work of the Holy Spirit in you, changing your mind and heart.

The Divine Service is about repentance. After the confession of your sins comes the Absolution, in which all your ugly, filthy, death-causing sins are forgiven. Next comes the Gospel of all that Jesus has done for you in winning forgiveness for you. And that is followed by Jesus giving you His Body and Blood to feed and strengthen you in your new life of faith and the Spirit.

The reason that you let go of your sins and cling to Christ is because Christ grabbed hold of you and your sins and clung to the cross for you. Thus, Lent is a joyful season of Christ and His gifts, for you. Repentant joy!

'Foro' is Spanish for forum. In LCMS International Missions, a Foro is a partnership of Lutheran people and institutions that help different mission fields do their work, on the ground, in the field.

The Eurasia Region of the LCMS Office of International Mission is establishing Foros for Spain and Romania to allow individuals, congregations, Districts and other LCMS organizations to participate in and support these growing fields. Foro Partners visit and learn the joys and challenges of their field, meeting and worshiping with the missionaries and the people they serve. They learn and discuss strategic plans with the missionaries, and in subsequent years, review their progress and discuss strategic plan adjustments with them. Foros also provide financial support to enable various projects, such as securing worship spaces or establishing theological libraries. Foro Partners become ambassadors for their field in their home church, circuit and district.

The Spain mission is holding their first Foro meeting, in Madrid, Spain, April 23 – 27. Former missionaries to Spain, Pastor David Warner (Custer and Hill City) and his wife, Shelee, will be attending. They would love to have you along to see a bit of Spain, learn about the mission, and become a partner of and ambassador for the faithful work being done there. Costs for travel, lodging and meals are the responsibility of the individual, or the congregation or group that is sending them. This is a significant investment. But, experience with Foros teaches us that the benefit, to the Mission Field, to Foro partners, and to their U.S. congregations, more than justifies the investment.
