Only take care, and keep your soul diligently, lest you forget the things that your eyes have seen, and lest they depart from your heart all the days of your life. Make them known to your children and your children's children (Deuteronomy 4:9).

Dear Christians, the summer has certainly flown by and I pray that you all had a good summer. Your calendars are probably pretty full right now with school, sports, concerts, and other things starting back up. Like all parents, I take great interest in what my children are learning, doing, and I think about their futures. What do I want my children to be when they are grown? I certainly want them to be hard workers, I want them to marry young and have children, and so on. You probably have other thoughts about what you



want your children and grandchildren to be when they grow up. Above all things though, we should all want our children and grandchildren to be Christians. Jesus says in Matthew 6: 19–21, *Do not lay up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rust destroy and where thieves break in and steal, but lay up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust destroys and where thieves do not break in and steal...Therefore do not be anxious, saying, "What shall we eat?" or "What shall we drink?" or "What shall we wear?" For the Gentiles seek after all these things, and your heavenly Father knows that you need them all. But seek first the Kingdom of God and His righteousness, and all these things will be added to you.*

Unbelievers want and seek many of the same things for their children as we do for ours. However, we Christians seek one thing above all things and that is the Gospel which is the greatest treasure. The Gospel is our greatest need because we are sinners and death is near. Death comes for all whether they are successful, rich, poor, etc. The Gospel absolves sin and freely gives hope, peace, light, and everlasting life. If you have the Gospel, then you have, as Jesus says, the one thing that is necessary. The world is passing away with all of its treasures and pleasures, but the Word of the Lord endures forever. We want our children to hold fast to His Word all their days.

We want our children, above all things, to be Christians and then everything else falls behind that. How do we sustain and nourish the faith of our children and grandchildren? How do we nourish and sustain our own faith? The answer is the Gospel, God's Word and Sacraments, which we gather around every Sunday. Through the Gospel God has worked faith in our hearts and through the Gospel our faith is nourished and strengthened. If we stay connected to the vine, then we continue to grow and be nourished. If we neglect church, then we neglect the Gospel which is to neglect our salvation and go back to sin, death, and unbelief. Faith wants to hear God's Word and receive His Sacrament. The Third Commandment says, "Remember the Sabbath Day to keep it holy. What does this mean? We should fear and love God that we may not despise preaching and His Word but hold it sacred and gladly hear and learn it."

If we neglect church, then what will our children and grandchildren learn from this example? They will learn that the Gospel is not important and not necessary. If we neglect church, then what do you think our children and grandchildren will do in the future? They will continue to do what they did growing up, not going to church. *Train up a child in the way he should go; even when he is old he will not depart from it* (Proverbs 22:6). Be faithful in hearing God's Word and receiving the Sacrament. If you have not been in church in a long time, then repent and come back. Gather around Jesus who absolves all sin and welcomes us all. The peace of the Lord be with you.

WORD FROM THE CENTER – September 25, 2023

Welcome to "Word from The Center" MONDAY, a devotional word from the Center of our faith, Jesus Christ, with reflections on His Word. I'm Gregory Seltz. Today's verses are from the Prophet Isaiah, chapter 55, verses 6-7, where he says, Seek the Lord while He may be found, call upon him while He is near; let the wicked forsake his way, and the unrighteous man his thoughts; let him return to the Lord, that He may have compassion on him, and to our God, for He will abundantly pardon.

THE OFFER OF GOD'S COMPASSION AND PARDON IS REAL — DON'T MISS IS IT!

Today many people are running around demanding apologies and retribution. It's a very difficult time in our country because many don't truly believe in "right and wrong" anymore, yet they are certain that their accusations against others are just. Even worse, most really have no idea as to what should be done to responsibly change things. Sinful people have a bad habit of pointing fingers at others and demanding that others change, as if their accusations against others somehow get them "off the hook." Our text for today doesn't let anyone get away with such things. In life, the main question is, "What does God think about our lives, according to His standards?" Then, when we fail to meet those standards, a follow up question asks, "Is there any hope?" Isaiah calls us all to account before the Lord in thought, word, and deed, and then invites us to return to God in repentance and faith. Real blessing only happens there. That's the main question. That's the main thing.

I was reminded about how destructive it can be when that "main question" is avoided. When I was in Germany several years ago, we had a young woman (not much more than 21) who led us through the Dachau death camp. It was a sobering experience. It's hard to imagine how human beings could do such things. Unfortunately, sinful human history is littered with similar, sickening acts. Many Germans have had to struggle with the fact that such things happened in their midst. Many wondered how such things could have happened in country that was а SO "progressive" intellectually and culturally at the time. How, indeed? But, sadly, what I learned that day at Dachau was that, instead of individually asking the main question of why so many of them had fallen away from God, many Germans preferred to find scapegoats, blaming the citizens who lived nearby the camp, projecting all that "sin" on to them. This young guide was one of those scapegoats. She wasn't even born WHEN the atrocities happened, yet many Germans had "tarred and feathered" her merely because she was BORN THERE. They claimed, "It was the people of Dachau, you see, not us." As a result, young people like this woman would be forced to live in shame so that others could go on their merry way. The problem? The main question still was unanswered.

We, as Americans, are dealing with many issues today, and **the real problem is that we don't see how far we've fallen away from the things of God**, the moral truths of the Bible. Many think that politics can "save" us. Politics won't save a people who feel no need to get right with God on His terms. Like Isaiah, Jesus reminds us of that urgency. Jesus declares that whoever hates his brother is a murderer (see Matthew 5:22) and adds, "Whoever looks lustfully at a woman has committed adultery in his heart" (Matthew 5:28). He concludes that inorder to meet God's standard, we are to "be perfect as your heavenly Father is perfect" (Matthew 5:48).

When you begin to feel the real weight of your own sin before God, Isaiah invites us to "seek the Lord while He may be found." Don't give into the temptation to falsely cast your guilt on to another person. Don't give in to the temptation to blame your parents, your teachers, or "the system." Sin, your sin, is so much more than all of that, but forgiveness for your sin is the beginning of living a "free life" that no government can ever take away. When the crushing reality of your sin hits home, that's the time to realize that God has a message for sinners like you and me. Realize that there is one who took away the crushing blow of your sin and mine as only He could. While it's wrong to cast your guilt upon others, Jesus invites you to bring your sins to the cross, because He is your Savior. Isaiah tells us to seek the Lord. Jesus tells us to put our faith in Him (John 14:1).

I don't know if we're going to come out of the sin-denving. libertine malaise of today because I haven't yet seen a "turning to God" moment. People aren't asking, "What does the Bible say about things?" or, "What does God think about our lives, about my life?" Yet, amazingly, many of those same people are confident about other people's sins, while remaining oblivious to their own. In the midst of this, take Isaiah's advice, "Return to the Lord" and be honest before Him, "for he will abundantly pardon." Then live lives of grace and truth towards others. That's not just a start; that's the only thing that will last.

PRAYER – Dear Lord, give us confidence to trust in Your "exposing" Word, as well as Your "saving" Word. Then give us courage to live lives graciously in Your name toward others. AMEN.

What was the world like during the time of the Reformation? The world was changing. New scientific discoveries had opened pathways for understanding more about our complex universe. The ocean, once feared for its danger and depth, was tamed for travel and trade. Peasants and workers, laboring under harsh and relentless conditions, sought revolution. The bubonic plague had claimed the lives of about 75 million people from 1347 to 1351. It continued to reappear and panic

European cities. Political alliances, long forged between pope and prince, fractured as power centers shifted. Gutenberg's press (1455), the first to use movable type, transported ideas from one person to the next with swiftness and ease. As the medieval era collapsed into the modern, changes seemed everywhere and limitless.

Yet even during these changing times one thing remained constant: our God, who grants forgiveness and grace to His people through Jesus Christ. Despite advances and transformations in science and society, politics and publication, God was working. He gave hope and life by His Spirit through Word and Sacraments. He bestowed comfort and joy in trying and often perilous situations. In changing times, His promises through His Son did not change, nor will they ever. They will never be altered, nor revoked. His Word pronounces us righteous through faith in His Son, Jesus Christ. He alone is our Life and our Peace.
