# **Resolving Conflict through the Four G's**

Conflict may be defined as "a difference in opinion or purpose that frustrates someone's goals or desires." These differences can range from simple disagreements such as where to go to dinner to more serious controversies that lead to divorce, lawsuit, or someone leaving a profession.

Misunderstandings, differences in goals or objectives, and competition over limited resources all contribute to conflict. However, Scripture teaches that another force initiates or exacerbates our squabbles. St. James writes: What causes fights and quarrels among you? Don't they come from your desires that battle within you? <sup>2</sup>You want something but don't get it. You quarrel and fight. You do not have because you do not ask God. <sup>3</sup>When you ask, you do not receive, because you ask with wrong motives that you may spend what you get on your pleasures (James 4:1-3).

What causes conflict? My desires. My wrong motives. Serving my personal pleasures. Sin almost always incites our conflicts. Actual sin may not spark the dispute, but two sinners in a disagreement find it all too natural to inflame the fight, defending their righteous causes with sinful thoughts, words and actions.

God's people need to acknowledge sin's role in conflict in order to respond to it biblically. To deny our sin is to deny our need for Jesus, who shed his blood on the cross for us. Admitting our sin leads us to repentance and faith, where healing and comfort are found in God's forgiveness. Proverbs teaches us, *He who conceals his sins does not prosper; but whoever confesses and renounces them finds mercy* (Proverbs 28:13).

True peacemaking is founded on the ministry of reconciliation, that while we were yet sinners, God reconciled the world to himself through his only son, Jesus (see Romans 5:8; 2 Corinthians 5:11–21). As forgiven children, we demonstrate love for our Father through our ministry of reconciliation to each other.


In the book "The Peacemaker: A Biblical Guide to Resolving Personal Conflict", Ken Sande summarizes what God teaches about resolving conflict in four principles, which Ken refers to as "The Four G's":

- Glorify God How can I please and honor God in this situation, and how can I give witness to what he has done for me through Christ?
- Get the log out of your eye How have I contributed to this conflict and what do I need to do to resolve it?
- **Gently restore** How can I help others to understand how they have contributed to this conflict?
- Go and be reconciled How can I demonstrate forgiveness and encourage a reasonable solution to this conflict?

Brothers and Sisters in Christ, all our efforts going forward are with the focus and priority of reconciling with our fellow members. This can only happen if we have an attitude of humility as Christ showed and is shared in God's Word. So if there is any encouragement in Christ, any comfort from love, any participation in the Spirit, any affection and sympathy, <sup>2</sup>complete my joy by being of the same mind, having the same love, being in full accord and of one mind. <sup>3</sup>Do nothing from selfish ambition or conceit, but in humility count others more significant than yourselves. <sup>4</sup> Let each of you look not only to his own interests, but also to the interests of others. <sup>5</sup> Have this mind among yourselves, which is yours in Christ Jesus, <sup>6</sup> who, though he was in the form of God, did not count equality with God a thing to be grasped, <sup>7</sup> but emptied himself, by taking the form of a servant, being born in the likeness of men. <sup>8</sup>And being found in human form, he humbled himself by becoming obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross (Philippians 2:1–8).

We pray: Dear God, govern us, that with spiritual eyes we may recognize and confess our inborn sickness and frailty, and so be brought to the right knowledge of Christ, and governed, purified, and sanctified by Your Holy Spirit. Amen!


"About Jesus of Nazareth," they replied. "He was a prophet, powerful in word and deed before God and all the people. The chief priests and our rulers handed him over to be sentenced to death, and they crucified him, but we had hoped that he was the one who was going to redeem Israel." **Luke 24:19-21** 

"Well, what did you expect?" The question was aimed at a disappointed voungster on an Easter morning. The blank look and the shrugged shoulders said, "I don't know." But what he really wanted to say was: "I expected more!" I know what the boy was thinking because I'm the one who was asked that question a while ago well, maybe more than a while ago. Christmas had made quite an impression: the decorations, the cookies, and the presents — lots of presents. Easter had a similar buildup: a special meal was planned, extra church services held, holiday cards exchanged — and my sister had said there would be a surprise on Easter morning. Some surprise. Some hardboiled eggs, a chocolate bunny, and a handful of jellybeans! I expected more from Easter. I wasn't the only one.

On Easter evening, two followers of Jesus were walking the road to Emmaus, talking about the unexpected events of the day. When Jesus joined them. unrecognized, they revealed their disappointment. Actually, they were disappointed in him. "He was a prophet, powerful in word and deed before God and all the people," they explained to this "stranger." Then, referring to the authorities, they reported: "they crucified him .... "What a letdown! This they did not expect. Instead, they said, "we had hoped that he was the one who was going to redeem Israel" (Luke 24:19-21). But he did! He did pay the ransom for the fallen human race! What more could they want? They wanted him to redeem Israel in the way they were expecting him to do it. Their expectations for Easter were far different than God's expectations.

How sad. But how common. And how current! The disappointed youngster who grew up still needs to guard against being disappointed in God's plans. His expectations still often run down a different path from those of his heavenly Father. On some days, he expects life to be easier than it often is: less stress, more money - and no deadly virus. On other days, he is surprised that problems have been solved; threats averted; and fears deflated — through none of his doing. He is learning not to second-guess how his God is going to work all things out for his good. He is learning to take a very hard look at what the first Easter means for him and those he loves. He is learning to expect much more from the Lord God than he could ever dream of. He is waiting to talk with those two fellows from Emmaus. He is expecting to do that on a perfect Easter-like day.

**Prayer:** Lord Jesus, your resurrection from the dead has proven that we will live forever. Keep the vision of Easter before our spiritual eyes that we may always cling to the certainty of life eternal when the day of our death comes. Thousand, thousand thanks shall be, dearest Jesus, unto thee. Amen.

## SUNRISE SURPRISE

The hidden surprise in these sweet rolls hints at the reason behind Easter's joy!

#### What you need:

- <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> cup chopped pecans
- 10 unbaked frozen rolls, thawed
- 10 large marshmallows
- <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> cup white sugar
- 1 tsp. cinnamon
- <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> cup melted butter
- <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> cup brown sugar
- Adult help

#### What you do:

- 1. Grease a round baking dish. Sprinkle pecans on the bottom.
- 2. Flatten each roll. Place a marshmallow in the center, wrap dough around it, and pinch edges together.
- 3. Combine white sugar and cinnamon. Dip each roll into melted butter and coat with cinnamonsugar. Place in pan, seam side down.
- 4. Sprinkle brown sugar and remaining butter over rolls. Cover with plastic wrap and let rise 30 minutes.
- 5. Bake at 350 degrees until golden brown, about 30 minutes. Cool in pan.
- 6. As you bite into a roll, you'll see the marshmallow has melted, leaving an empty center — just like Jesus' empty tomb!

#### Be on the Right Side of History, or Study History? by Peter Scaer

When the odds are against us, how do we know when to quit, to throw in the towel? Well, the answer is that we will never quit. We will work while it is day before the night comes, and no man can work. No one can know the future. We are told that we need to get on the right side of history, but such talk is vanity. History will be what we make of it, and more pointedly, what God makes of it.

When people claim to be on the right side of history, what they really are saying is that they are going along with the flow, that they are following public opinion in order to remain with the "in crowd" defined by phony academia, the mainstream news, Hollywood, big tech, big sports, and all the rest. But it's not their approval that we seek.

The phrase "the right side of history" is all the more ironic, as it is spoken in an age in which most everything is being thrown down the memory hole. Rather than seeking to be on the right side of history, we would do well to study history, to read older books, with the idea that we are living in an age of vanity, having no idea what we don't know, unwilling to be taught by those who came before us.

Ah, to be on the right side of history is really no more than the vanity of being popular, the vanity of being well-liked by the people who seem to matter, the so-called pillars. But we know where history is actually leading. There will come a day, sooner than ever, when our Lord will return in clouds, accompanied by his mighty angels. And then, it won't matter what the Washington Post says; won't matter the professors and celebrities tell us is true.

All that matters will be God's judgment, God's Word. And that word is available to us today. The truth of life in the womb, of real marriage, of male and female. It's all there, along with the Christ who came to save us. So, let's skip any talk about being on the right side of history, and spend our time, every day, without growing weary, working and praying that we remain on the right side of eternity. And together we'll celebrate the harvest.
