God has so composed the body, giving greater honor to the part that lacked it, ²⁵ that there may be no division in the body, but that the members may have the same care for one another. ²⁶ If one member suffers, all suffer together; if one member is honored, all rejoice together (1 Corinthians 12:24-26).

In 1 Corinthians, Paul describes a divided and struggling congregation, not unlike what we are going through today. In 1 Corinthians we hear how the Lord brought them through their struggles, using the sound theology and counsel of the apostle Paul, focusing on salvation through the Lord Jesus Christ. History shows that, despite early struggles, the congregation survived and prospered (e.g., we have Clement of Rome's letter to them from 40 years later).

God's Word of truth in 1 Corinthians is an important book for us to consider right now. Through the words given in 1 Corinthians 12:24-26, God tells us how to work with each other to become stronger as a congregation and to grow as the body of Christ. God tells us in this body of Christ we are to help each other. If one member has a weakness or is lacking in ability, others within the body work together to support and help overcome that area of weakness. In our world today it seems more common to exploit weaknesses rather than show true love to a person by helping with their weakness. As Christians and in keeping with the 8th commandment we try to cover weaknesses rather than exploit them. This is especially true within the church and the body of Christ as God tells us in 1 Corinthians 12:24-26.

I call this to our attention in light of the recent challenges we have been experiencing. I have had time to reflect on the concerns and complaints from some of our members. Some of you have said that I don't call our members as much as I should. You are right. I could do better. I confess my sin to those who may have been hurt by me not reaching out as I should. I ask for everyone's forgiveness. I do desire to do better. Assuming I have your forgiveness, I now appeal to you as brothers and sisters in Christ for help. Because of the way I was raised, because I'm naturally introverted, I confess this is a weakness of mine. I assure you there is NO ONE I'm not willing to visit. There is NO ONE I'm not willing to call. But because of who I am, my weakness and my struggles I do not just naturally think of calling or visiting people. This is where I humbly beg for your help and assistance to cover my weakness. I'm easily contacted through email, social media, text, or a phone call on my cell (605-641-8501). Even if I don't answer right away please leave a message. I promise I will call back as soon as I possibly can. Please help us become a stronger body of believers by working with me to cover my weaknesses toward our members. Please just let me if someone's sick. Please let's work together as one body to have the same care for one another. ²⁶ If one member suffers, all suffer together; if one member is honored, all rejoice together.

It is my honest prayer that we come together in unity and love as the body of Christ!! As Paul says in Ephesians 4:1-6 I therefore, a prisoner for the Lord, urge you to walk in a manner worthy of the calling to which you have been called, ² with all humility and gentleness, with patience, bearing with one another in love, ³ eager to maintain the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace.⁴ There is one body and one Spirit—just as you were called to the one hope that belongs to your call—⁵ one Lord, one faith, one baptism, ⁶ one God and Father of all, who is over all and through all and in all. I'm not perfect, nor can I be, but I will certainly do everything I can to work with you through my weaknesses I just ask for a little help from you to do it.

The grace of the Lord Jesus be with you. ²⁴ My love be with you all in Christ Jesus. Amen. Pastor Lessman

We are to grow up in every way into him who is the head, into Christ, ¹⁶ from whom the whole body, joined and held together by every joint with which it is equipped, when each part is working properly, makes the body grow so that it builds itself up in love (Ephesians 4:15-16).

LENT 2021

Return to the Lord

In the Book of Joel, the prophet paints a vivid picture of the coming judgment of God, the Day of the Lord. The imagery is bold and terrifying: hordes of locusts swarming over the land and decimating everything. Joel's prophecy has teeth even today as wars rage, natural disasters threaten and destroy, and our culture seems to be unraveling. But right in the middle of this frightening portent, we find a tender invitation from the Lord: "Return to the Lord your God, for He is gracious and merciful, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love; and He relents over disaster" (Joel 2:13). God's invitation and promise finds its fullness in Jesus Christ, who personifies and accomplishes all that God declares. During this season of Lent, we will consider the theme "Return to the Lord" and examine how the call to return played out in practical ways for the people who walked alongside Christ as He demonstrated and carried out God's grace and mercy on our behalf, taking God's wrath upon Himself, setting the stage for God to "turn and relent, and leave a blessing behind Him" (Joel 2:14).

Each sermon will focus on a particular event in the Passion, with a special focus on the people involved in the event. Studying the events and people helps to connect us with our own sinful nature, emphasizing how we have turned away from the Lord, and to reinforce and rejoice in God's call for us to return to Him with all our heart.


